Don Francisco sang a song entitled "Love is Not a Feeling (It's an Act of Your Will)." That's real life. Most people go into marriage with a fairytale illusion of what *happily ever after* is.

Did you ever notice that, in fairytales, the book or movie always ends right after the wedding, and you don't get to read or see how they lived out their married life? You either read or are informed by the narrator that "they lived happily ever after?" But how does that translate to real life?

First of all, *ever after* is relative to the life span of the marriage partner who dies first. The phrase in the wedding vows "till death do us part" means that they are committing to each other and to God to stay together for as long as they both shall live.

"For in the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels of God in heaven."

Matthew 22:30

God's design for marriage is one man and one woman together until death separates them.

Now, concerning *happily*, the fairytale version of happiness is some type of unrealistic fantasy existence free from problems, heartache, sorrow, pain, or any other unpleasantness. Obviously, real, true happiness has to exist in the midst of all those things. Indeed, how would we know what happiness was if we had never experienced sorrow?

True love doesn't live on *Easy Street*. It requires longsuffering, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. It's not always a warm, fuzzy feeling. Sometimes it's a sheer act of your will—staying true to your word, your commitment, your promise, your mate, your God.

You Can be Happily Married

So many young people today are scared to commit to marriage. They are bombarded by this statistic over and over again: "Nearly 50 percent of first marriages end in divorce." They are so terrified that their marriage will fail that they

choose rather to remain single and enjoy the opposite sex by way of dating, with no long-term commitment.

The good news is that this statistic does not have to apply to you, at least not in a negative sense. If you follow the plan laid out in this book, your marriage will be one of the over 50 percent that does stand the test of time.

I find it very interesting that few people mention the fact that **over 50 percent of marriages are successful**. Have you ever stopped to wonder what kind of people make up that over 50 percent? What do they do differently that makes their marriages last? Do they just get lucky?

Fortunately, success in marriage is not based on luck. Anyone can experience it. That is precisely the purpose of this book; to present a nearly fool-proof, step-by-step plan for "How to find and marry the right person at the right time." I say *nearly* fool-proof because if someone is foolish, they will reject wise counsel, and therefore miss out on the benefits that God offers to all who will accept them.

The truth is that **you can have a successful marriage**.

First Things First

I have to admit, the ideas in this book are not my own—I got them from another book. You may have read it, or at least started reading it. It's called the *Holy Bible*.

Unless you understand that God created people and marriage, you won't be able to glean the full benefit of this book. Consider these verses:

Before you begin this study, take a few moments to examine your relationship with God. Whether you are a single person, or the parent of one, it is imperative that you consider the topic of marriage from God's point of view, not man's. God designed marriage to be something beautiful, to be a blessing. It's just common sense to go back to the source, the Bible, to discover how He intended for it to work. Please don't give in to the erroneous idea that the thoughts that I am going to share in this book are old-fashioned because they are based on biblical principles, many of which are not widely practiced in modern society. The principles and truths of God's word are not old-fashioned; they are **timeless**. They don't belong exclusively to any time in history; they transcend time and culture. God is not limited by time or space, and neither are His truths.

Divine truth, when rightly understood and applied, is always new and exciting. It is always relevant, at any time, in any culture or society. As each new generation discovers God's eternal Word, they find it to be exactly what they need to live a happy and productive life on this earth.

That which has been *is* what will be, That which *is* done is what will be done, And *there is* nothing new under the sun.

The Rest of the Story

I expect you must be wondering how my own story ended. Did that happy young couple in the picture really live happily ever after? Was it really *love at first sight*?

Many of the concepts in this book may seem radical, but keep in mind that what most people are doing today concerning marriage is not working! The institution of marriage is in serious trouble, and the solution calls for radical measures.

If you are serious about finding and marrying the right person at the right time, I am confident that you can do it, and I'll tell you how.

Real World Application

At the end of each chapter, I have included a "Real World Application" section to serve as a review of the main points brought out in the chapter, and to apply them to your life right now.

My "real world" has never been a perfect world. Even though Gail and I were Christians when we met, and I believe I had enough discernment to know it was God's will for us to marry, we didn't have the advantage of this book, or any other teaching on the subject. Everything we learned came too late for us to apply to our life. But I'm writing this book for my children and my children's children, and for anyone who will learn from it and apply its principles.

What if it's Too Late?

I don't believe it is ever "too late" to do the right thing. In fact, I believe it is always the right time to do the right thing. You may have messed up your life. You may have been going down the wrong path for years. But don't despair—there is still hope. This is not a book of condemnation, but of hope, of solutions, of answers.

All Things New

I'm sure your "real world" is not perfect either. But, do you know what? God can change your world. No matter how rotten your life has been up to this point, He can make your world new starting right now. But you have to do your part. Decide right now, before we go any further, that you will apply your maximum effort to change your world—your life—and I assure you that God will do His part.

The rest of your story is yet to be written. Choose to be among the over 50 percent group. Prepare yourself for a marriage that will last a lifetime. Don't settle for less than the best that God has planned for you.
